**Subject:** Resolution to make findings allowing continued remote meetings under Brown Act

**RECOMMENDATION:**

Adopt a resolution finding that, as a result of the continuing COVID-19 pandemic state of emergency declared by Governor Newsom, meeting in person for the San Mateo County Child Care Partnership Council would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.

**BACKGROUND:**

On June 11, 2021, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N-08-21, which rescinded his prior Executive Order N-29-20 and set a date of October 1, 2021 for public agencies to transition back to public meetings held in full compliance with the Brown Act. The original Executive Order provided that all provisions of the Brown Act that required the physical presence of members or other personnel as a condition of participation or as a quorum for a public meeting were waived for public health reasons. If these waivers had fully sunset on October 1, 2021, legislative bodies subject to the Brown Act would have to contend with a sudden return to full compliance with in-person meeting requirements as they existed prior to March 2020, including the requirement for full physical public access to all teleconference locations from which board members were participating.

On September 16, 2021, the Governor signed AB 361, a bill that formalizes and modifies the teleconference procedures implemented by California public agencies in response to the Governor's Executive Orders addressing Brown Act compliance during shelter-in-place periods. AB 361 allows a legislative body to continue to use teleconferencing under the same basic rules as provided in the Executive Orders when certain circumstances occur or when certain findings have been made and adopted by the legislative body.

AB 361 provides that Brown Act legislative bodies must return to in-person meetings on October 1, 2021, unless they choose to continue with fully teleconferenced meetings because a specific declaration of a state or local health emergency is appropriately made. AB 361 allows legislative bodies to continue to conduct virtual meetings as long as there is a gubernatorially-proclaimed public emergency in combination with (1) local health official recommendations for social distancing or (2) adopted findings that meeting in person would present an imminent risk to health or safety of attendees. AB 361 became effective on October 1, 2021 and will sunset on January 1, 2024.

AB 361 also requires that, if the state of emergency remains active for more than 30 days, the legislative body must make findings by majority vote every 30 days to continue using the bill's

exemption to the Brown Act teleconferencing rules. The findings demonstrate the need for teleconferencing persists due to the nature of the ongoing public health emergency. Effectively, this means that legislative bodies must either agendaize a Brown Act meeting once every thirty days to make these findings, or, if a legislative body has not made such findings within the prior 30 days, the legislative body must re-adopt the initial findings if it wishes to conduct a remote meeting.

**DISCUSSION:**

The COVID-19 transmission rates are higher this month than they were on November 15, 2021 when the San Mateo County Child Care Partnership Council adopted a resolution first invoking the provisions of AB 361. The state of emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19 continues to directly impact the ability of members of the San Mateo County Child Care Partnership Council to meet safely in person; and conducting in-person meetings at the present time would present an imminent risk to the health and safety of attendees. A resolution to that effect and directing staff to take such other necessary or appropriate actions to implement the intent and purposes of the resolution, is attached hereto.

**RESOLUTION FINDING THAT, AS A RESULT OF THE CONTINUING COVID-19 PANDEMIC STATE OF EMERGENCY DECLARED BY GOVERNOR NEWSOM, MEETING IN PERSON FOR THE SAN MATEO COUNTY CHILD CARE PARTNERSHIP COUNCIL WOULD PRESENT IMMINENT RISKS TO THE HEALTH OR SAFETY OF ATTENDEES**

**WHEREAS**, on March 4, 2020, pursuant to Government Code section 8550, et seq., Governor Newsom proclaimed a state of emergency related to the COVID-19 novel coronavirus, and subsequently, the San Mateo County Board of Supervisors (“Board”) declared a local emergency related to COVID-19, and the proclamation by the Governor remains in effect;

**WHEREAS**, on March 17, 2020, Governor Newsom issued Executive Order N- 29-20, which suspended certain provisions in the California Open Meeting law, Government Code section 54950, et seq. (the “Brown Act”), related to teleconferencing by legislative bodies, provided certain requirements were met and followed; and

**WHEREAS**, on June 11, 2021, the Governor issued Executive Order N-08-21, which extended provisions of Executive Order N-29-20 that waive otherwise-applicable Brown Act requirements related to remote/teleconference meetings by legislative bodies through September 30, 2021; and

**WHEREAS**, on September 16, 2021, Governor Newsom signed AB 361 into law, and AB 361 provides that a legislative body subject to the Brown Act may continue to meet without complying with the otherwise-applicable requirements in the Brown Act related to remote/teleconference meetings by legislative bodies, provided that a state of emergency has been declared and the legislative body determines that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees, and provided that the legislative body makes such finding at least every thirty (30) days during the term of the declared state of emergency; and bodies, provided that a state of emergency has been declared and the legislative body determines that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees, and provided that the legislative body makes such finding at least every thirty (30) days during the term of the declared state of emergency; and

**WHEREAS**, on September 28, 2021, in the interest of public health and safety, as affected by the state of emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19, the Board issued a finding that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of

attendees, and decided to invoke the provisions of AB 361 related to teleconferencing for meetings of the Board; and

**WHEREAS**, the San Mateo County Child Care Partnership Council has an important governmental interest in protecting the health, safety and welfare of those who participate in its meetings; and

**WHEREAS**, in the interest of public health and safety, as affected by the emergency caused by the spread of COVID-19, the San Mateo County Child Care Partnership Council finds that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees, and the San Mateo County Child Care Partnership Council will therefore invoke the provisions of AB 361 related to teleconferencing for meetings of the San Mateo County Child Care Partnership Council.

**NOW, THEREFORE, IT IS HEREBY DETERMINED AND ORDERED** that

1. The recitals set forth above are true and correct.
2. The San Mateo County Child Care Partnership Council finds that meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health or safety of attendees.
3. Staff is directed to take such other necessary or appropriate actions to implement the intent and purposes of this resolution.

## Coordinator's Report for May 16, 2022

This report summarizes recent activities of CCPC staff and developments in the field.

### State Budget and Legislation

On May 13, Governor Newsom released his "May Revise" budget. The revised budget proposal can be found at <https://www.ebudget.ca.gov/>. Further budget details will be shared in the CCPC meeting.

The updated CCPC Legislative Tracker can be found <https://tinyurl.com/CCPC2122LegTracker>. Bills directly impacting child care, preschool, and after school include:

- **AB 1649 (Quirk-Silva):** Would require the alternative payment program to reimburse child care providers based upon the maximum certified hours of care, rather than attendance. Would also include intent language relating to equitable access to child care for working families and a set reimbursement for all licensed and exempt providers who accept subsidized child care vouchers.
- **AB 2131 (Mullin):** Would remove outdated language remaining in statute regarding the "toddler option" that creates a barrier to the implementation of a single license for child care providers.
- **AB 2501 (Carrillo & McCarty):** Would establish the California Universal Afterschool Program Workgroup within the Dept. of Ed. to evaluate policy and regulatory impediments to ensuring the quality of and increased access to after school programs and any access impediments faced by pupils and their families, develop legislative and regulatory recommendations and specific proposals to reduce those impediments, and develop a roadmap for providing universal access to after school programs to all school age children.
- **AB 2806 (Rubio):** Defines expulsion and suspension in preschool and child care settings serving children 0-5 that contract with the state, eliminates exclusionary practices, and provides that expulsion and suspension will only be used as a last resort. Requires the state to collect and report data on exclusionary practices and strengthens due process for families who are impacted by suspension and expulsion. Strengthens and clarifies the early childhood mental health consultation services provided for children in age 0-5 in state preschool and general child care programs. Co-sponsored by State Supt. Thurmond, Santa Clara COE, Kidango, and Black Men for Educational Equity.
- **SB 976 (Leyva):** Would establish a single regionalized state reimbursement rate system for child care, preschool, and early learning services. To address the problems of a bifurcated rate system, resource expenditures should be streamlined and expended in ways that: 1) Compensate teachers and programs for the cost of providing care; 2) Are responsive to the economic diversity of California; 3) Recognize the costs of meeting varying quality standards, regulations, and contracting burdens; and 4) Incentivize high standards and participation in research-based quality improvement efforts as a means to improve child outcomes.
- **SB 1047 (Limón):** Would extend eligibility for child care and preschool to families in which a member of the family has been certified as eligible to receive benefits from certain means-tested government programs, including Medi-Cal and CalFresh. Would extend the time a family is considered to meet all eligibility and need requirements for services to 24 months. Would make a child who is less than 3 years of age, but at least 18 months of age, eligible to enroll in the CA state preschool as long as the child meets all other eligibility requirements.
- **SB 1481 (Becker):** Would require CDSS to provide funding for (1) a supplemental state meal reimbursement for preschool, child care, and Trustline providers for up to 2 daily meals per child served through the CACFP at a rate equivalent to the state meal reimbursement for LEAs; (2) reimbursement of up to 2 daily meals per child served through the CACFP at a specified rate in

order to establish a free meal program for all children receiving care from those providers; and (3) grants to those providers, and sponsors of the CACFP, to encourage their participation in and expansion of the CACFP. Would also increase the reimbursement rate for meals served in family daycare homes to 100 percent of the meals served.

**Key Dates:** May 27 - bills must pass out of their house of origin & June 15 - budget bills must be passed.

### County American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Funding

The County Board of Supervisors will be considering how to allocate their second round of ARPA funding at a meeting on May 17. At that study session they will review a proposal to dedicate \$9,195,000 to programs that support “Children and Families” including supports for child care for children 0-5 and supports for after school and summer programs. See page three of this report for the recommendations that CCPC approved in November 2021 for how the County could use ARPA funding to support the recovery of the early learning and care sector. ### San Francisco Wage Initiative

Last month, the City of San Francisco unveiled a plan to use a significant portion of their Prop. C (the Babies and Family Fund) to improve pay for child care workers who work in taxpayer-funded preschools and child care. “The hope is to not only lure and retain preschool and child care workers in the city, but also expand the availability of subsidized programs for low- and middle-income families, with children from birth through age 5.” A summary of the plan can be found in this Chronicle article: <https://www.sfchronicle.com/sf/article/Up-to-a-30-000-raise-in-works-for-S-F-childcare-17131821.php>

The implementation of this initiative will impact the child care field in San Mateo County as some teachers/child care professionals may leave our county to work in San Francisco where they can earn higher wages.

### CCPC Membership Updates

Two CCPC members’ terms will end on June 30, 2022: Heather Hopkins and Tina Watts. Ms. Watts has agreed to serve for another term, as a Public Agency Representative, from July 1, 2022 to June 30, 2026. Ms. Hopkins has decided not to return for a third term as a “Discretionary” Representative. Thank you for your eight years of services on CCPC! We will review any applications that are on file and determine whether to open up for new applications. Look for more information at our June CCPC meeting.

# Supporting Recovery of the Early Learning and Care Sector in San Mateo County

## *Addressing the needs of center and home-based programs serving children ages 0-13*

The COVID-19 pandemic has revealed the essential nature of early learning and care programs serving children ages 0-13 in our community. These programs allow parents to work with peace of mind and provide stability and nurturing for children that mitigates the impacts of trauma and stress, and contribute to healthy child development. However, these programs have been hit hard financially and are struggling to recruit and retain qualified staff. The recommendations for the use of American Rescue Plan (ARPA) relief funds presented below will provide relief that will stabilize and strengthen this valuable sector, ultimately expanding access to affordable, quality care for children ages 0-13.

### Stabilize Existing Programs (\$6.1 million)

- Offer General Operating Support grants
- Provide technical assistance to Relief Fund Grantees to help them stay in business
- Offer grants for Health and Safety Facility Upgrades
- Launch a Public Education Campaign to educate parents on safety of child care to increase enrollment\*
- Provide at-home COVID-19 test kits for low-income families to help prevent community transmission\*

### Support the ELC Workforce (\$4.1 million)

- Pilot workforce development strategies that provide Career Navigation for ELC workers and improve the ELC workforce development system
- Offer grants to ELC employers to offer Recognition Payments for staff
- Provide Incentives for Recruitment/Retention of ELC staff

### Build Small Business Capacity (\$250,000)

- Pilot Shared Services business support for family child care and small centers

### Strengthen Community Infrastructure (\$1 million)

- Create and build sustainability of a Centralized Application and Wait List
- Analyze needs and pilot strategies to support School Age programs
- Plan for increasing capacity and funding for the Child Care Partnership Council

\* These strategies may be funded through local philanthropy or grants.

## Zip Code Priority Setting for 2022-23

Every year, the CCPC has an opportunity to **update zip code priorities that are sent to the California Department of Education (CDE) and the California Department of Social Services (CDSS)** and inform about where the **areas of greatest need are for *additional* subsidized infant/toddler, preschool, and school age child care** for low-income families. In addition to informing CDE and CDSS about priorities for where to direct new funds should they become available, examples of how the priorities have been used recently include:

- Build Up for SMC's Children uses them in advocating for new facilities to be created in different parts of the County
- SMCOE has used the priorities in grant applications to make the case for new funding targeted in specific communities

**We last updated the priorities in 2021-22.**

**About the data** used to update the priorities:

- **Need** is based on family income and employment status for CTTR (infant/toddler and school age funding) and income only for CSPP (State Preschool). The most recent data available is from the American Community Survey from 2018 (5-year estimates).
- **Supply** data is from 2018 also, and is based on enrollment in CCTR, CSPP, the Alternative Payment Program, CalWORKs Stage 2/3, Head Start/Early Head Start by family residence PLUS a count of Transitional Kindergarten and ASES spaces for school age.

All the Local Planning Councils in the state use the same data source for setting zip code priorities.

The **process for determining the priorities is set by CDE** in [Management Bulletin 15-04](#). Priorities are due to CDE by May 30 of every year. Once approved by the CCPC, changes to the priorities must also be approved by the County Board of Supervisors.

### **Recommendation**

Because the 2018 "Need" data is the most recently available, **CCPC staff proposes to roll the 2021-22 priorities forward to 2022-23**. We anticipate having updated "Need" data available to do an update for 2023-24.
